* [sc, ch 3, skip 2 sc, sc] x 6, join with a sl st (18)

Round 4 (Yellow):

* sl st in the ch-3 space of the previous round * [sc, ch 1, (dc, ch 1) twice, sc, ch 1] x 6, join with a sl st (36)

Round 5 (Green):

* sl st in the ch-1 space of the previous round * [sc, ch 2, (dc, ch 2) twice, sc, ch 2] x 6, join with a sl st (54)

Round 6 (Blue):

* sl st in the ch-2 space of the previous round * [sc, ch 3, (dc, ch 3) twice, tr, ch 3, tr, ch 3, dc, ch 3] x 6, join with a sl st (84)

Round 7 (Yellow):

* sl st in the ch-3 space of the previous round * [popcorn stitch, ch 2, (dc, ch 2) twice, sc, ch 2] x 6, join with a sl st (96)

Round 8 (Green):

* sl st in the ch-2 space of the previous round * [sc, ch 3, (dc, ch 3) twice, popcorn stitch, ch 3, tr, ch 3, dc, ch 3] x 6, join with a sl st (126)

Finishing & Blocking

Once you have completed crocheting the cornflower motif, you will need to finish and block it to shape and enhance its beauty.

Finishing:

1. Weave in any loose ends. 2. Trim any excess thread.

Blocking:

1. Soak the motif in lukewarm water for 10-15 minutes. 2. Remove excess water by gently squeezing the motif. 3. Pin the motif to a blocking board, spreading out the petals and shaping the lace. 4. Allow the motif to dry completely.
