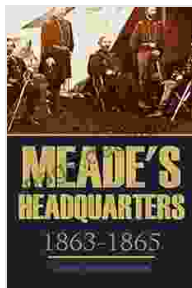


Meade Headquarters 1863-1865: The Nerve Center of the Army of the Potomac

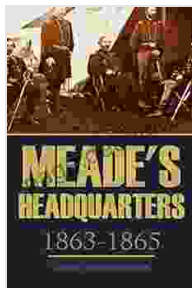

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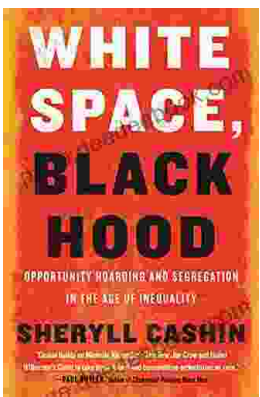
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
