
## **Puffin Proportions**



Puffins are remarkably well-adapted to their marine environment. Their stocky bodies, short wings, and webbed feet make them excellent swimmers and divers.

Their beaks, which are covered in tiny serrations, are perfect for catching and holding fish. And their colorful beaks, which serve as a form of identification within the colony, fade away during the winter months when the birds are not breeding.

#### **Family Matters**



Puffins mate for life and return to the same nesting site year after year. They typically lay one egg per season, which is incubated by both parents for about six weeks.

Once the chick hatches, both parents work tirelessly to feed it fish. The chicks grow rapidly and are ready to leave the nest after about 50 days. They then take to the open ocean and spend the next few years at sea before returning to their natal colony to breed.

#### **Puffin Paradise**



Eastern Egg Rock is a sanctuary for puffins and other seabirds. The island is protected by the National Audubon Society and is off-limits to visitors during the breeding season from April to August.

This protection has helped the puffin population to flourish on the island. Today, there are an estimated 10,000 pairs of puffins nesting on Eastern Egg Rock, making it one of the largest puffin colonies in North America.

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
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
