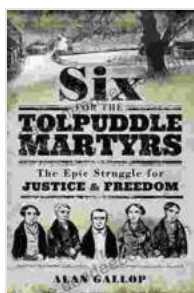


Six for the Tolpuddle Martyrs: The True Story of England's First Trade Unionists

The Tolpuddle Six

All six men were agricultural laborers who lived in the village of Tolpuddle in Dorset, England. In 1833, they formed the Friendly Society of Agricultural Labourers, one of the first trade unions in England. The union's goals were to improve wages and working conditions for agricultural laborers.

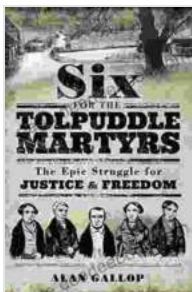

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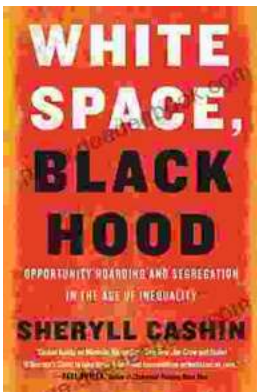
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
