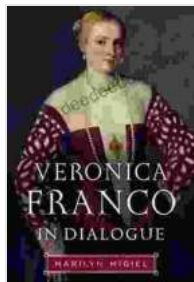

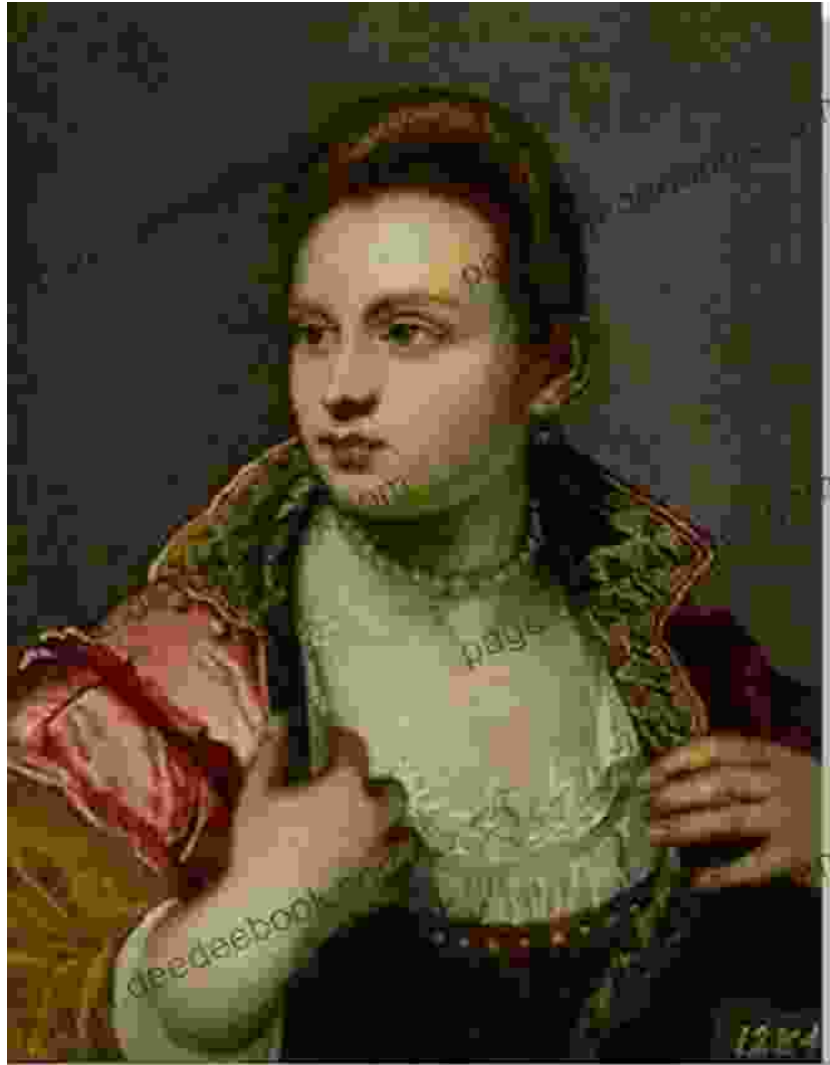

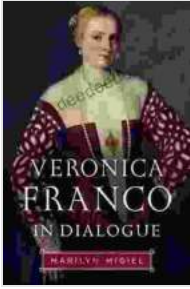


Domenico Tintoretto, *Young Venetian Woman*. Ca. 1590. Prado Museum, Madrid, Spain.

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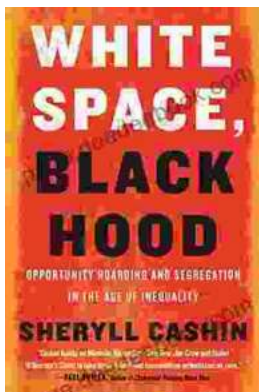


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
